
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

January Guest Speaker is Clay Pimental worked as a financial manager at General Motors

for 30 years. After retiring he wanted to do something fun and only four days a week. He went to work for Worlds of Wonder of Fremont California in customer service. Worlds of Wonder produced the Teddy Ruxpin teddy bear doll. In 1985, Teddy Ruxpin was the "Yuppie Toy of the year". He will tell about his experiences in customer service and how he became known as Dr. Bearwell. Teddy Ruxpin in 1985 cost \$80.00. It had 40 different cassette tapes that fit into the tape deck in its back, with a computer chip that reads a digital encoding on the tape and fires a signal to motors that operate the bear's movable parts: its mouth and eyes. About 7 million of the dolls were made and about 6 million are still alive, many of them thanks to Clay Pimental.

Tri-City Voice, July 6, 2015, Lila Bringhurst writes that the Museum of Local History received a check of \$1,000 from Mission San Jose Chamber of Commerce that completed the goal of getting \$5,000 in matching grants from the Despeaux Good Works Fund in honor of Regina Dennie. This article included a picture of **Gil Garza** accepting the Check from the Chamber of Commerce.

Tri-City Voice, January 6, 2015, **Joyce Blueford** writes that the latest rainfall has made the Tule Ponds in the heart of Fremont more enjoyable.

Tri-City Voice, December 30, 2014, **Phil Holmes** writes about the Prohibition Raids after prohibition became the law of the land on February 1, 1920. Phil states that this was not a popular law in this area and there were many bootleggers and stills operating here. Prohibition was repealed on December 5, 1933.

Tri-City Voice, December 9, 2014, **Phil Holmes** writes about the year 1934, when unemployment issues dominated the news. 27 men were hired to drain 700 acres of Warm Springs mosquito swamps , and another 24 men were paid 60 cents an hour to drain Newark swamps. The annual Elementary school field trip in April was cancelled due to an epidemic of Diptheria and 6 cases of Infantile Paralysis (Polio) were reported in the county.

Tri-City Voice, December 9, 2014, **Pat Kite's** garden talks about Morning Glories, there are about 400 varieties with 40 varieties somewhat available. They come in many colors and some can grow to 10 feet high and up to 5 feet wide.

Tri-City Voice, December 9, 2014, Al Minard of Washington Township Historical Society spoke at a Fremont City Council meeting about the Shinn family and the Christmas decorations and the Shinn open house. This article included a picture of Al speaking to the City Council.

Tri-City Voice, December 2, 2014, Al Minard submitted an article with photos of the James and Lucy Shinn House decorated for Christmas and a brief history of the Shinn family.

Tri-City Voice, November 18, 2014, **Phil Holmes** writes about the History of the year 1933 or The Great Depression. Phil states that the economy was the big news item with the State Legislature waging a battle to save California from going bankrupt. Schuckle cannery in Niles was scheduled to employ 125 people canning fruit salad, the concrete plant in Niles closed and Kraftile burned.

MERGER NEWS

At our regular meeting in November, we invited Mission Peak Heritage Foundation and the Museum of Local History Guild to attend and discuss the possibility of merging the three organizations together to form one large organization. The major reason that we are doing this now is that the City of Fremont has dedicated a 9.000 square foot building site at the Mission Nursery in Niles for a Museum. None of our three organizations has enough money to build this museum but we think that if we are working together maybe we can raise enough money to build this museum.

Lila Bringhurst, Gil Garza, Joan Serafino and Al Minard all met with a Fremont attorney and discussed the issues that we will have to deal with. He seemed to think, having worked with other non-profits, that the best way is to form a new organization, with new by-laws.

After this meeting, we began the process of forming a transition committee to work on by-laws, articles of incorporation, size and composition of the board, voting rights, etc. Most of the historical organizations have designated members to serve on this transition committee. One of the large issues is finding a name that is representative of this combined historic organization. The ideal name would be an easily remembered name, representative of the area we serve and have an acronym that would make for an unused website that we could create. Websites are the way of the future and this will be where we will get our younger members, who can carry on our historical endeavors.
