She was ahead of her time with a woman chauffeur to drive her Pierce Arrow car and a trophy husband who made no decisions about the house or the grounds. His primary job was to look good in a tuxedo. Tours are provided only on Wednesday and for about 40 people who have to enter an online lottery to get chosen as a group of one or two people. The tour was free. When it was built it was the largest mansion west of the Mississippi.

The "Pop" Goold house was still standing the last time I drove down Peralta Boulevard. Everyone still wants to move it but the problem is getting a construction loan on a vacant lot that is in a family trust. We keep throwing ideas out hoping that something will work.

Guest Speaker is Alan Frank

Alan Frank is one of the major historians at the Niles Canyon Railway. At our meeting on Monday, July 24, 2017, Alan will talk about his latest project the Livermore Train Depot. The Transcontinental Train ran through Livermore on its way over the Altamont Pass. When passenger trains stopped running and trains only carried freight, the people of Livermore wanted the freight trains moved out of downtown. The rails were moved but the railroad depot was not needed for freight so it stayed there and went through many changes until a few years ago when it was decided to demolish the depot. Historians came in and worked with City of Livermore to save the depot and now are well into the process of moving it over to the location of the train tracks are now located. Passenger service has come back with the ACE train so this depot will once again be used for a passenger depot. This is not in Washington Township but I thought this is such a beautiful story that it needs to be told to a wider audience.
