# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It has been thirty three years since the Essanay Studio Plaque was dedicated on May 17<sup>th</sup>, 1980 in the Niles district of Fremont. John Weed was the master of ceremonies. Mayor Leon Mezzetti unveiled the plaque and Donald Parkhurst gave the address. Only six plaques were produced from the models produce by Gerion Rios (a budding artist at the time). This was the 3<sup>rd</sup> plaque produced for the Washington Township Historical Society. Of the six plaques produced, the Essanay Studio casting was the only one that showed significant deterioration with age, which is anomalous. The original plaque has been recast with a few text corrections. The recast plaque is beautiful and tentatively we plan to rededicate the plaque in June 2013.

## Gerry Low-Sabado, is our guest speaker at our March 25th meeting.

Gerry is a fifth generation Chinese woman whose heritage, in California, dates back to 1851, when her ancestors arrived in the Monterey area from China. They were fishermen and learned how to fish for shrimp. She has a documentary that she will show us that was done by one of the local universities that explains her heritage and some of the trials of the Chinese in the 1850's and later. She has been involved in some of the archeological digs by Stanford University that were been done recently, where her ancestors in California lived in the Monterey Area.




