I then said that what I really wanted was for more students to get involved with History Day and she contacted Mr. Maxwell who set me up to meet with Social Studies administrators with the various schools. I met with them Wednesday, March 12 and I think it was a good meeting. OUR MARCH SPEAKER IS AL MINARD

Al recently contacted the Fremont Unified School District and was invited to speak about History Day to the Social Studies administrators of the Junior and Senior high schools. On Saturday, March 15, Al was one of the judges at History Day for Alameda County, held in the Oakland Museum. He will speak of these experiences and is trying to get a Documentary on the Loma Prieta Earthquake of 1989.

Al also attended a meeting of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation. This is a Federal Commission that reports directly to the President of the United States and to Congress. We met in Oakland on the Post office closures and sales. Al did speak but was one of many. The sale of historic post office buildings has been temporarily stopped by Congress, but the United States Postal Service is determined to sell these buildings. It was a 3-hour hearing.

Al and several other members of Washington Township attended the Conference of California Historical Societies meeting in Napa, and can also report on this symposium.

MEMBERS IN THE NEWS

Tri-City Voice, January 21, 2014, **Paul Sethy**, Board President of the Alameda County Water District, states that ACWD is taking this third dry year very seriously. Paul says that "our water conservation efforts in the past have really helped lessen the impacts of dry conditions. We need to continue these habits and developing new ones will be critical this year."

<u>Tri-City Voice</u>, January 21, 2014, **Phil Holmes** writes, "History Column: A Lady Visits Mission San Jose". "Eliza Farnham, a widow, came round the horn in 1850 to take charge of a farm near Santa Cruz... She plowed, planted, hammered and performed whatever tasks were necessary to build a home in the Santa Cruz wilderness... She rode horseback about the country...made notes about the crude, barbaric activities of men in early California Society." She later wrote a book on these observations titled, "In Doors and Out".

Tri-City Voice, February 4, 2014, **Phil Holmes** writes, "History: Lost Vineyards of Washington Township". Phil reports that the 1893 report states that Mission San Jose produces the most wine of any area in Washington Township. There were 33 vineyards producing wine from 680 acres of vineyards. The vineyards ranged from small ones of one acre up to the Gallegos vineyard of 600 acres.

<u>Tri-City Voice</u>, February 11, 2014, Carol Zilli, reports on the Red Grammer Concert. Red Grammer is considered the best voice in Children's music. His concert was a fund raiser for Music For Minor II, which trains docents to provide weekly music lessons for children in the schools.

<u>Tri-City Voice</u>, February 11, 2014, **Pat Kite's** Garden tells us that it is time to prune our roses. Pat says that you need to cut out dead branches, and open the center for more light to get into the plant to encourage more rose growth. She says that you can do it all at once or a little at a time, but do not take too long.

<u>Tri-City Voice</u>, February 11, 2014, **Dr. Joyce Blueford**, of the Math/Science Nucleus Museum in Fremont brought some Irvington Fossils to the Mineral and Gem Society of Castro Valley at their 3-day show and sale. Dr. Blueford's Fossils was the highlight of this show.

<u>Tri-City Voice</u>, March 4, 2014, **Dorothy Bradley** president of the Niles Silent Film Museum in Niles reports on "not so silent Saturday Night" at the silent films in Niles with the piano players playing music to accompany the action on the screen and not having a score to follow.

<u>Tri-City Voice</u>, March 4, 2014, **Dr. Joyce Blueford**, president of the Math/Science Nucleus Museum, led a walk on March 8, 2014, that followed the Hayward Fault. She was joined by the United States Geological Survey team and City of Fremont. This was a one-mile walk that followed the path of the Hayward Fault through Fremont.

<u>Tri-City Voice</u>, March 4, 2014, **Phil Holmes** writes, "History Column: City Beautiful Committee". Phil reports on minutes that go back to 1961. The City Council decided that it would be helpful to have an advisory committee to assist them protecting and developing their city. They also set up a Tree Preservation Ordinance that designates Landmark trees. Ted Harpainter said, "No place is complete without trees, a home without trees is charmless, a street without trees is shapeless, a park without trees is purposeless and a country without trees is hopeless."

<u>Tri-City Voice</u>, March 11, 2014, **Pat Kite's** Garden reports on Garden Superstitions. Pat admits to being a somewhat superstitious person and she reported on what the plant reference books have to say about assorted fruit and vegetable superstitions. She reports that Carrots are not only a love potion, but also eating them makes one sexier.

We received the "<u>Love Notes</u>" Newsletter for January – February 2014, from the League of Volunteers. They highlighted their Thanksgiving and Christmas events as well as their Volunteer's luncheon volunteers.

Pacific Locomotive Association purchased some years ago, a SP-9010 locomotive that was specially designed for high traction. The original drive had been removed and Pacific Locomotive Association thought that was the end of the story. Then they heard from a friend in Germany that 10 trucks had been shipped back to them from the SP scrap yard. They found the original trucks in Paris, France and put in a bid for them. Their bid was accepted but when they were inspected by a friend in the UK, they found they were not complete. Paris gave them two trucks with some extra parts at the bid price and all of this has now arrived in Sunol.
