

PLAQUE COMMITTEE Report

The plaque committee (Al Minard, Bruce Hevelin, Timothy Swenson, Regina Dennie & Gil Garza) has been reviewing past and potential future plaque designs to recognize significant historical landmarks within Washington Township. The six plaques that WTHS has already dedicated are detailed in a Tri-City Voice article by Phil Holmes: September 17, 2008 History: Washington Township Plaques. As part of the due diligence for reviewing plaque designs, we took a good look at the original plaque design that was created for WTHS 35 years ago by Gereon Rios. It turns out that we have the original clay model Mr. Rios used to create the six cast bronze relief plaques. The plaque features a side view of the original Mission San Jose along the top with smaller depictions of Mayhews Landing and the first court house building in Alvarado on the side.

After a bit of research we found that Mr. Gereon Rios is alive and well. He is living in Sonora California where at the age of 69 he teaches painting (oil, water color) and sculpture. The plaque created for WTHS was the work of local Fremont artist, Gereon Rios, who went on to pursue a career in the Arts and has accumulated a significant body of work in the field. Mr. Rios also created the City Seal of Fremont (as a teenager) and has portraits that hang in the Dominican Sisters of Mission San Jose in Fremont, The Sisters of the Holy Family and the Hibernia Bank in San Francisco. Gil plans to meet and interview Mr. Rios and give an update on some of the early days of WTHS and the plaque that was created to highlight important local historical sites.

Al would prefer writing a letter that gives some reasons why we would like to see this park saved for future generations. There is a video on YouTube with Art Kimber talking about the original chicken ranch and how the park was converted from a level tomato field to make hills and a lake with two islands and a couple of boats for the workers at Kimber to take their family and enjoy nature. Al drove around the park that is now fenced, but when he drove by they were taking some of the fencing down. There are a variety of trees on the property and it seems from Art Kimber that they were planted in about 1950. Art does talk about the high school softball players coming out and throwing potatoes anywhere they wanted and a UC Professor deciding which tree should be planted where each potato landed. William Hammond Hall (1846-1934) superintendent of Golden Gate Park said, "Destroy a public building and it can be rebuilt in a year; destroy a city woodland park and all the people living at the time will have passed away before its restoration can be effected."

Listing of events at Historic sites

The James & Lucy Shinn House will be open for tours on Friday evening, December 2, and December 9, 2011 from 7-9 PM. The house will also be open for tours on Saturday & Sunday, December 3 & 4th, 2011 from 12 Noon to 4 PM. The house will be decorated in a style similar to what it may have looked like for Christmas in 1890.

Patterson House will hold its "Victorian Christmas Fantasy" on Thursday & Friday, December 8 & 9 and 15 & 16 with house tours at 1, 2 and 3 PM. Saturday & Sunday, December 10 & 11 and 17 & 18 will also have house tours at 11 AM, 12-Noon, 1 PM, 2 PM and 3 PM. The Patterson House will also be open to tour on Friday Evening December 9 from 5 PM to 8:45 PM

Christmas at Ardenwood will be held on December 3rd & 4th from 10 AM to 4 PM, which will include the horse drawn train, a search for the Yule Log and a visit with Father Christmas.

Niles Canyon Railway will run their Christmas Train of Lights starting Friday, November 25 thru Thursday, December 29, with runs on Wednesday (Bargain Train), Friday, Saturday and Sunday, except Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. The train will also run on Monday, December 19 & 26 and Thursday, December 22 & 29. The train leaves Niles at 4:15 with boarding 45 minutes prior to departure. You will not be able to get off in Sunol. The train also leaves Sunol at 7; 15 PM with boarding 45 minutes prior to departure. You will not be able to get off the train in Niles if you board in Sunol.

The Niles Festival of Lights Parade is Friday, November 25, 2011 starting at 6:30 PM going down Niles Boulevard starting near Sullivan's Underpass and ending at the Merchants Train Car parking lot. Santa will be available for pictures after the parade at the Niles Merchants Train car

The Niles Holiday Home Tour is Saturday, December 10 from 12 Noon to 5 PM beginning at the Niles Depot in the Niles Plaza. Tickets are \$15 in advance and \$20 at the door.

Las Posadas is held in the Mission San Jose area every year. This year they will only walk from the Old Mission Museum to the individual sites on the first night and the last night. They sing Christmas carols on the walk which is a good chance to exercise those vocal chords.

Niles Canyon Railway Train of Lights. This is a wonderful experience with over 1 million lights on the train. The Train departs Niles at 4:15 as a round trip ride with no opportunity to get off at the midpoint of the ride in either direction. The train also departs from Sunol at 7:30PM as a round trip ride. The train now has a lift so it can accomodate wheelchairs and others who have problems climbing stairs. The ride lasts about one hour.

Fresh greenery wreaths are hung in every window in the Shinn House. The house has a live Christmas tree in the Front parlor and typical Christmas gifts on loan from Marie Dear under the tree. We will also have hot cider, coffee, tea and sweets in the archive room for those who want to stay and visit a while. Please remember to visit our gift shop for a nice present for someone special. The Shinn House is a seemingly unknown resource in Fremont which does not get enough visitors. There are two steps to get into the first floor and two steps from the house to the archive room.
