### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings Members and friends,

We are moving forward on placing up to three plaques one in Fremont and two in Union City. There are a lot of agencies that have to be contacted before something like this can be done beside all of the research to make sure everything on the plaque is accurate.

We mourn the death of Lionel Goularte he was a good friend to history and had a lot of information from his years of living at the Higuera Adobe location.

We need to get more people excited about learning about the history of the area and attending one of our meetings. We need more people who are willing to become officers of the organization. There is not that much work and it gives you a chance to get some of the items done that you consider important.

Historical tours are being done on a more or less regular basis in Niles, Alvarado, Mission San Jose and Irvington.

Washington High School has a Military memorial plaque for those who served in WW I and WW II. This plaque is located where the old Football field was but it is now the practice field and gets ignored. I met with the school, Dr. Morris the Superintendent of Schools and others to determine a more accessible location. It was placed in 1947 and we are expecting to have it moved near the memorial at Tak Fudenna Memorial Stadium by this fall, about 70 years after it was originally placed.

Our speaker this month is our own Timothy Swenson, who will be talking about "The Controversy in New Haven" school district. The movie "Nothing But a Man" was shown at several English classes at James Logan High School in 1967. Al Minard

Our Speaker, Tim Swenson will be talking about the controversy in the New Haven School District after the movie, "Nothing But A Man" was shown to several English classes at James Logan High School. The movie was about a black railroad section gang worker who fell in love with the preacher's daughter, an educated school teacher. Reverend Elliot Paulson was president of the New Haven School Board and strongly objected to the teachers showing this movie. Roger Ebert in reviewing this film in 1993 said that this film released in 1964 has been cited as one of the first and best of a new era of films about African Americans. The film had only a spotty release and was not seen by most people. There is a bit of nudity and some rough language in the film, which would probably only rate a pg rating today but then was not rated at all. Tim has written a very nice paper on this controversy and it will be available from the Museum for \$3, or you can get it online for free.

March 14, 2017, *Tri-City Voice*, William Marshak interviewed Dan Schoenholz, the Deputy Director of Community Development for the City of Fremont about linkage fees. Linkage fees are intended to fund affordable housing and they come from market rate housing fees. For the period from 2015-2023, Fremont has been asked to produce 1,714 very low income units, 926 low income units, 978 moderate income units, and 1, 837 above moderate income units. Categories are defined by a percentage of Area Median Income (AMI) which in 2016 was set at \$65,000 for an individual, and \$93,600 for a family of four. Extremely \Low Income is 30% or less of the AMI, Very Low Income is defined as a maximum of 50% of the AMI. We have not met our Regional Housing needs said Schoenholz.

March 14, 2017, *<u>Tri-City Voice</u>*, Gretta Stimson of the Hayward Area Historical Museum reports on their Scots-Irish immigration as it pertains to the McConaghy House with guest speakers, Hayward City Councilman Francisco Zermeno, Hayward City Councilman Mark Sullivan, and Immigration Lawyer Spojmie Nasiri

March 14, 2017, *<u>Tri-City Voice</u>*, Daniel O'Donnell reports that Fremont, California is the largest city in the United States to be named after John C. Fremont (1813-1890). The Fremontia is a flowering bush that bears John Fremont's name and is the official plant of Fremont. There are several growing here in the area.

March 14, 2017, <u>*Tri-City Voice*</u>, Niles Canyon Railway, which features Wine Trains on a frequent basis realized that there are many more beer drinkers in the area and several craft beer breweries. They held a Beer Train on March 18 and I think they will hold more of these events. The money raised help restore and preserve the trains and the railway.

March 14, 2017, *Tri-City Voice*, Saranya Singh, 5<sup>th</sup> grader, Gomes Elementary School reports on students at Gomes participating in National History Day doing Poster Exhibits. Four students from Gomes were selected to compete in the State level on May 6, 2017. They were mentored by Mission San Jose High School student Lavanya Singh.

Some of the ones to watch include: The Irvington Bart Station; the East-West Connector between I-880 and I-680; the cleanup of the Mission Clay Products site in the Niles area.

Structure Properties of San Francisco plan to update the building to accommodate 41 studios and one-bedroom apartments. The Green Shutter Hotel was built in 1926 and was one of three destination hotels in the area.

April 4, 2017, *<u>Tri-City Voice</u>*, East Bay Regional Park District reports that with all of the rain wildflowers are blooming in abundance all over the Park District. The Sunol-Ohlone Regional wilderness held a Wildflower Festival on Sunday, April 9, 2017.

April 4, 2017, *<u>Tri-City Voice</u>*, Bobbie MacDonald reports that the Relay for Life of Fremont was held on Saturday, April 29, 2017. Ride the Rails through beautiful Niles Canyon. This event benefits the American Cancer Society and this was the 8<sup>th</sup> annual Niles Canyon Railway team event.

## NATIONAL HISTORY DAY, CALIFORNIA

National History Day for California was held May 6-7. 2017 in Rocklin, California at the William Jessup University. The Theme for History Day this year was, "Taking a Stand In History", the theme is always very broad to encourage the students to expand their subjects. Elementary students compete as either an individual or as a group of up to 5 students to make a two-dimensional poster about the history topic.

Junior and senior high school students compete as either individuals or as groups of up to five students in four categories: Museum Exhibit, Documentary, Performance or Website. They also compete as individuals in Historical Papers. Junior high students compete against junior high students and senior high students compete against senior high students. Students from all over the state enter this competition and two winners are selected from each of 18 categories of junior and senior high projects to go to the National Competition in Maryland

Alameda County sent a nearly full contingent of projects to California History Day, and quite a few came from Fremont.

As a Past President of the Conference of California Historical Societies, of which Washington Township is a member, I have judged Documentaries at the County Level and at the State level, I and others judge Historical Papers and Museum exhibits. I am always learning something new about the history of California and I am convinced that the students who enter this competition will be the future leaders of this country, in business, education, the arts, science and even politics. They are wonderful young people.
