

Regena Anita Schneider Dennie

Dec 15, 1930 to Sept 12, 2014

A resident of Mission San Jose all her life, Regena Anita Schneider Dennie passed away peacefully from complications of cancer on

9/12/2014. Her family was by her side. Regena had lived most of her life in the same house, was a good neighbor who had deep roots in the community and was an active participant in many local organizations. Regena was born at the Silva Maternity home on Dec 15, 1930 in Niles, Calif. Her parents Alois Schneider and Maria Wiest Schneider emigrated from Germany in the 1920s. She grew up in Mission San Jose and graduated from Washington Union High School as did her younger siblings Cecilia, Carl, and Rosemarie. She married Leo Robert Dennie in 1954 and had 2 children, Patricia Ann and Susan Marie, who predeceased her mother 2008. After her husband, Leo, passed away in 1963 Regena started work at Sears and Roebuck Co. at the Fremont Hub and retired after 35 years. Regena played the organ at St. Joseph's Catholic Church. She was deeply involved in local history and worked hard for the Committee to Restore Mission San Jose and was active as a docent



at the old mission where she conducted tours. She also helped establish the Museum of Local History and gave tours to 3rd grade classes. Regena was a member of the Washington Township Historical Society and AARP. Her love of history got her involved playing the pump organ at the Patterson House (She had 'groupies'). She was a faithful member of the Catholic Daughters of America (Court Father Francisco DeLasuen, No

1508) and was presented with her 65 year pin in April 2014. Regena got the ball rolling for the National Night Out LeMarc St neighborhood get-together which has been declared to be one of the best parties in Fremont. Regena was a positive force in the lives of her 3 grandchildren, Lindsey Schuck, Robert Lacy, and Cameron Sherman - helping out at school, with homework, and taking care of them during school holidays. Regena had a loving heart, a ready smile, and a ready hand. She taught her two girls that if you want something done ask a busy woman. So it is not surprising that if you needed a rocky road cake or brownies for a bake sale, a ride to a doctor appointment, or even a pint of blood she was there for you. Regena loved her garden, daily Mass, meals out with friends, and day trips with her family. Regena is survived by her daughter, Patricia, who called her mom her 'She-ro'. Her grandchildren and younger siblings Cecilia Costa, Carl Schneider, and Rosemarie Olsen, their spouses, and all her wonderful nephews, nieces, great nephews and great nieces.

She will be terribly missed by them and all her many friends. A celebration of her life will be held 11 AM Friday, September 26th at St. Joseph Catholic Church. Merger between The Museum of Local History, Washington Township Historical Society and Mission Peak Heritage Foundation.

Meeting to discuss this merger will be on Monday evening at 7:15 PM in the IOOF Hall, Fremont Boulevard, Fremont, near five corners in Irvington. The meeting will be held upstairs and there is an elevator so that no one has to climb the stairs. We invite everyone who has an interest in this merger either in favor of or against this merger to come out to this meeting and bring your questions and comments. If you cannot make the meeting send your comments to Al Minard by e-mail at "alminard@comcast.net" or by phone to Al at (510) 552-4839. If you do not attend or send comments we will assume that you support this merger.

The Museum of Local History was started almost 20 years ago and supported by both Washington Township Historical Society (WTHS) and Mission Peak Heritage Foundation (MPHF). Artifacts and volunteers from both organizations helped to start the Museum and then a few years later the museum applied for and received their own non-profit status. They now have about 100 members and their income comes from museum admissions, membership dues, grants and donations. They are actively archiving the history of Washington Township in print, photo, and artifacts. They have a larger collection than they can display even on a rotating exhibit format. They have several volunteers doing computer input and archival work. They print a quarterly newsletter.

Washington Township Historical Society was founded in 1954 and is the oldest surviving historical organization in the Tri-City area. They have a membership of almost 100 members. They have promoted the installation of plaques on historic sites, and a bimonthly meeting featuring a local historian telling about their individual history. They have worked with the Museum of Local History to provide tours of the Higuera Adobe. They own no buildings and only use the Museum of Local History building for their meetings. All of their artifacts are stored in the museum either donated or long term loan to the Museum. They have a \$10,000 Certificate of Deposit dedicated to the installation of plaques in Washington Township. Their income is mostly from annual membership dues and an occasional grant or donation. Their largest expense is the printing and mailing of their bimonthly newsletter, and the Liability Insurance. They also give a small gift card to non-member featured speakers at our bimonthly meeting.

Mission Peak Heritage Foundation (MPHF) was founded in 1972 by Dr. Robert Fisher to restore and preserve the historic buildings in the area. The buildings they have preserved include the Shinn House, the Patterson House, the Harvey House and the Higuera Adobe. Today they are mostly involved with the preservation and presentation of the Shinn House in Fremont. MPHF has the largest bank account checking and certificates of deposit total near \$50,000. Their income comes from Membership Dues, House tours, Special events, Teas, donations and the occasional grant. They have the largest expenses in paying for window shades, carpets and light bulbs inside the house. They have a few dedicated volunteers but need more docents. They publish a quarterly newsletter with at least two pages in color. They also have to pay Liability Insurance and membership in the Conference of California Historical Societies to be eligible for the liability insurance. They also provide lunch for the workers who decorate the house for Christmas and for Docent outings to other historical house museums.

I think the merger between the Museum of Local History(MLHG) and Washington Township Historical Society(WTHS) is a great idea. I am not so sure about joining with Mission Peak Heritage Foundation (MPHF) because they have a different agenda.

Here are my questions about why we should do this and some of my comments about the process.

1. The City of Fremont has invested over \$600,000 to study the development of the California Nursery, which at present is expected to allow for the construction of a 9,000 square feet museum, which we desperately need. Several people feel that the only way we can get enough clout to get this museum and the funds to build it is to merge so that we show a united front. My fear is that the City is good at dreaming and not so good at implementing these plans.

2. The plan is to have one organization as yet un-named to manage and coordinate all of the activities with chairpersons that will handle the day to day operation of the Shinn House, The Museum, the bimonthly speaker meetings, and probably one monthly newsletter. I think this part will work.
3. We will have to rewrite or create new by-laws for this new organization and get the government to approve the incorporation as well as the non-profit status. I am sure this is possible, but may need legal help.
4. One of the goals of this new organization is that we will be able to gain more members. Each one of the organizations has gained a few new members every year, just about balancing out those we loose. Will we gain a lot of new members, docents and volunteers to help us run this organization? I am not sure, I think we can but it will take a lot of work promoting this new organization.
5. How will we manage the money? Will we put it all in one big pot and designate it for special things like plaques, Shinn House Maintenance, Computer software for the museum, etc.? That will probably be the best plan, but it will be hard to monitor.
6. How will funds raised from Shinn House tours and Museum tours be handled, will each of them be designated to the organization that received the money? Probably the best plan.
7. If the City continues to support the building of a museum at the California Nursery will we be asked to raise all of the funds and if so how will we do this? Can we raise enough to build a 9,000 square foot building with all of the proper archival protecting equipment it will need? Maybe but again this will not be easy. Will it be easier with all of working together?, Yes definitely.
8. How many members will be on the new large organization Board? Will we have two or three from each organization, will we only have one from each and several at large members?
9. Many people have been talking about merging these three organizations together for some time, Is this the time?
10. Will we encourage other historical organizations to join us and if so how will that change the Board?
11. Printing a monthly newsletter will save some money but not much. The three organizations are printing smaller newsletters generally that total about 14 per year. A monthly newsletter will be larger to cover all events and parts should be in color because it makes it more attractive. If we can get the postal mailing over 200 on a regular basis we can mail it by bulk mail which will be a sizable saving.

"This is a matching grant," said Garza. "We need to raise \$5,000 from local residents and small businesses in order to receive the grant."


Regena Dennie, a charter member and long-time board member, recently passed away. Her family and the museum board have created a memorial fund in her honor, with a goal of raising money to match the grant.

Harriet Despeaux, a Fremont philanthropist who died in 2011, left a substantial estate to be administered by the EBCF for grants to non-profit organizations in the Tri-City area. The current round of grants focuses on local non-profits who work in the fields of education, environment, social services and health.

"We are honored to support the Museum of Local History. When we can leverage the gift of one donor to attract additional support for a project, that deepens the power of giving," said Nicole Kyauk, Philanthropic Advisor at the EBCF. "The Despeaux fund will continue to focus its work to benefit the Tri-City area."

The museum has several collections that need to be processed. "Local residents stop by regularly to donate family heirlooms and items of interest," said museum volunteer curator, Patricia Schaffarczyk. "With this grant we can hire someone so the work can be completed and more readily available to students and researchers"

Donations should be made to the Museum of Local History Guild, for the Regena Dennie Memorial Fund. The museum is open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesdays and Fridays and the second Saturday and Sunday of each month.


